Since the late 1990s, the literature on regional innovation systems in Sweden has been one of the more abundant and lively on the international scene, especially due to the work undertaken at the CIRCLE laboratory at Lund University (Asheim & Isaksen 2002, Asheim et al. 2011). Although most of these studies tend to focus on hightech industrial clusters in larger cityregions. Focus on rural innovation has been rarer. In this Research Brief, we review some of the more recent studies that propose a fresh outlook on the innovation processes that take place in varied rural and regional settings.

INNOVATION IN THE BIOECONOMY

In their qualitative study, Karlsson et al. (2017) investigate four Swedish farms producing biogas from organic waste. Despite their potential, biogas plants in Sweden have not been profitable ventures yet. Karlsson et al. (2017) propose to use business model innovation (BMI) in strategies for arranging. producing, and marketing farm-produced biogas. BMI appears to be especially beneficial for creating public-private networks with the aim to invest in farmbased biogas production. These investments stimulate rural development and provide new business opportunities and market outlets for SMEs in the agricultural sector. The study found that the network of public and private actors in farmproduced biogas production places a high value on environmental sustainability as well as on other social benefits because of the reduction on fossil fuels for energy

Biorefineries have been in the spotlight as a possible regional development strategy for the implementation of smart specialisation in rural biomass-rich regions. Looking at the case of Processum in Örnsköldsvik. Dubois and Kristensen (2018) show the increasing integration of scientific

knowledge production capabilities on the site of the cluster, whereas earlier stages focused essentially on industrial applications of knowledge developed elsewhere. The biorefinery in Örnsköldsvik has had a long-ranging effect on local development and dynamic synergy creation, based on biorefinery outputs such as heat.

> Ten years of cluster cooperation within the framework "The Biorefinery of the Future" has resulted in: 61 new products, services, or processes; 58 prototypes; more than 100 approved patents: 10 new companies and about 30 business expansion investments or establishments.

A main takeaway from the Processum case is the progressive transformation of the cluster into a more integrated complex spanning from bulk commodity production, to industrial and manufacturing process design to scientific and operational knowledge coproduction and diffusion.

Results from the researcher survey



Question number

The aim was to reach out to individual researchers based in Swedish research organisations and collect their own experiences and perspectives of working in the field of rural and regional research.

Sent by email to 244 scholars -> a priori 'unknown' population

Completed responses: 156 (varies depending on the question...)

Procedure

- 1. Build a database by screening research organisation homepages
- 2. Create a survey template using the online survey service Netigate
- 3. Send off the survey via email
- 4. Snowballing for more participants

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
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Do you identify yourself as a rural and/or regional researcher?


43%, respectively 37%, of respondents are fully or partially engaging in rural, respective regional, research.

35% chose to identify themselves using another terminology, including civil society, natural resource management, environment, landscape, demography or entrepreneurship.






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How is rural and regional development integrated in your university cursus?




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The field engages a broad spectrum of disciplines

Ethnology, forestry sciences and health care are other disciplines that were mentioned.



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
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What research methods are most commonly used?

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

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




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

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
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


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
Planning for services and welfare is considered the most pressing issue for Swedish localities and regions

Size proportional to frequency of mentions

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

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
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Cooperation between institutions often starts with collaboration between individual researchers.








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


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Creating arenas of exchange and providing financial support are key to facilitate future cooperations in the field




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Who finances Swedish rural and regional research?



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
To what extent do you cooperate with societal actors?



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What form does such a cooperation usually take?




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Scholars commonly use between 5 and 25% of their time for societal outreach activities.



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

Scholars engage in societal outreach in multiple ways, both orally or in written form.



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
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Funding

- Lack of societal interest ("the urban norm")
- Research field lacks merit or tradition
- Arenas of exchange and collaboration are missing
- Challenges regarding research implementation
- Anchoring and application in local practices is limited
- Politicisation and policy-driven research agenda

Perennial partnerships, a knowledge bank and long-term funding are initiatives that may improve the field's societal added-value



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- Fine line between rural and regional research and thematic research applied to localities and regions
 - 'peripheral' place in both education and research
- Differences in how 'non-urban' places are approached
 - Rural -> focus on societal change
 - Regional -> focus on economic development
 - Thematic -> focus on environmental impacts
- Rural vs regional research: Qualitative vs quantitative? processes vs trends?
- An open field
 - Few professorships dedicated to rural/regional development in Sweden,
 - from academic specialties to multidisciplinary themes: what place for territorial research?
 - Limited domestic interest on rural/regional issues spurs international cooperation
 - Rural research is performed is close interaction with stakeholders


